WHIRL GETS BIG CUP

Another Mix-Up in the Queen's Cup Race—Racing Over Q.C.Y.C. Bay Course.

To-morrow is one of the big days in yachting circles in this town. Both the Queen City and Royal Canadian Yacht Clubs will hold their annual regattas to Oakville, and there will be a big time in the lake shore port in the evening, when the sailor laddies foregather at the Commodore's residence, and have their annual picnic.

Q.C.Y.C.'s Good Card.

The Queen City Yacht Club has a lively little program for to-morrow. To-morrow's card includes the Class A and B cruise to Oakville, in which such well-known boats as Albion, Verona, LeBlanche, Koo Lex 1, Naomi, Maymie, and Milled will start. In Class C the Club and Meteor look up again for another one of their close races, while, thanks to the sportsmanship of S. L. Ritchie, of the Unknown, who refused to sail a walkover race in August, there will be a race for the sixteen-foot class. The division will have a postponed race, too. This race was originally started on August 31, but George Bewick sailed his ship upside down, and Pat Werther abandoned the race to go to Bewick's rescue. The rest of the racing men finished, but unable to supply the officials with their decision to call it "no race," and to sail it over again. The miscellaneous class also has a postponed race, to sail on the course in the unavoidable absence of his opponents. This will probably be sailed September 21.

Whirl Struts the Cup!

Hard luck is pursuing the Queen's Cup race at the R.C.Y.C. this season. On July 1, the original date, Aggie won, but as one of the buoys had been carried away and the judges' boat, which acted as a temporary buoy, was not in the correct position, the race was ordered resailed yesterday. Yesterday the buoy was again missing, and the judges' boat acted as a mark. This time Strathcona won, but Aggie refused to complete the course and will protest. The chances are that the cup will go to Strathcona, for this time the judges' boat occupied the proper position.

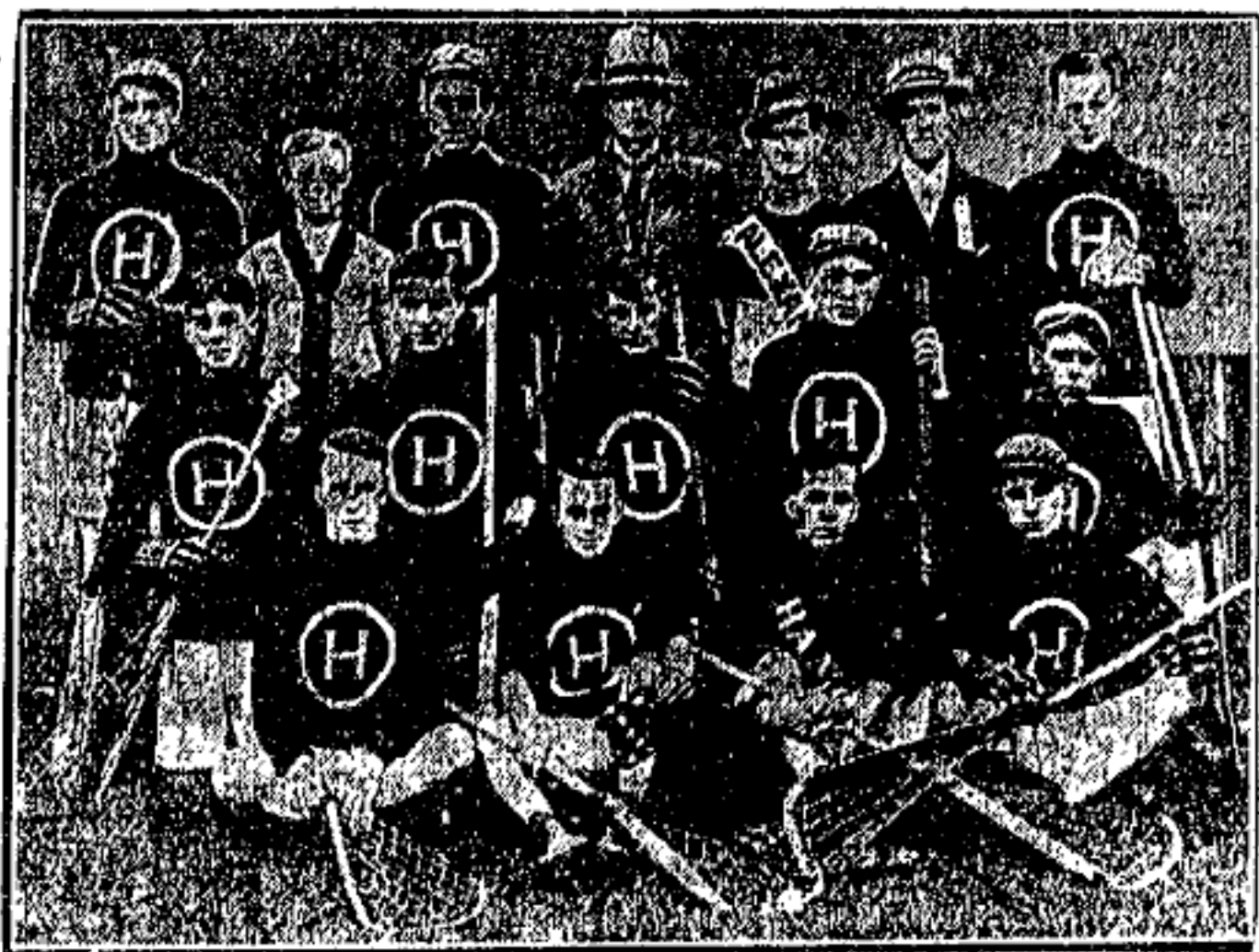
Whirl's Prince of Wales' Cup.

GOSSIP FROM TRACKS

The smallest jockey who has ridden around here since the days of the late Charlie Phair, is riding at Dufferin Park. He is little Snider, who yesterday rode Watch Me to victory. He rode Chilton Trace to his first win the day before, and both Wednesday and yesterday got a grand reception. The lad only weighs 79 pounds. He can out-pace and go to sleep on a racing saddle. He had a loss at Valleyfield this summer, but in the very next race almost put a couple of rough-neck riders over a fence for slouthing. He is a Toronto boy. His riders Philopona at 83 pounds to-day. He is apprenticed to J. G. Wagnon.

The old rogue Gilpin was the only winning favorite at Dufferin Park yesterday. After trying a dozen times to win the wrong way on the track, he was at last persuaded to tramp around it the same way as the rest of them, and at once proceeded to show them all the trail to the cashier's window.

Four out of seven races at Dufferin Park yesterday furnished good, lively contention. Two to others were won rather handily, while the fourth race was the greatest procession ever. From a bad start they were all strung out from three to five lengths apart, with Jim L. leading what looked like a parade before the grand stand.

Eugene Lutz' Messenger Boy, in training here for the Kentucky Endurance run of four miles has gone wrong, and will be retired to the stud. Messenger Boy won this race last season.

The entry list is very large, and there promises to be the keenest competition in every race.

The meeting of Cole and Staudt is, of course, the tid-bit of the year in motorcycle racing, and all of the enthusiasts will be out to see these two great riders in their battle of open races. The largest field that ever raced the starter in Toronto will compete in the novice handicap bicycle events. There will be an special street car service to the track.

FIVE-MILE RACE. The Central Y.M.C.A. five-mile handicap last night at Varsity furnished some excellent sport. Harry Tressider won on scratch with the limit minutes and thirty seconds ahead. 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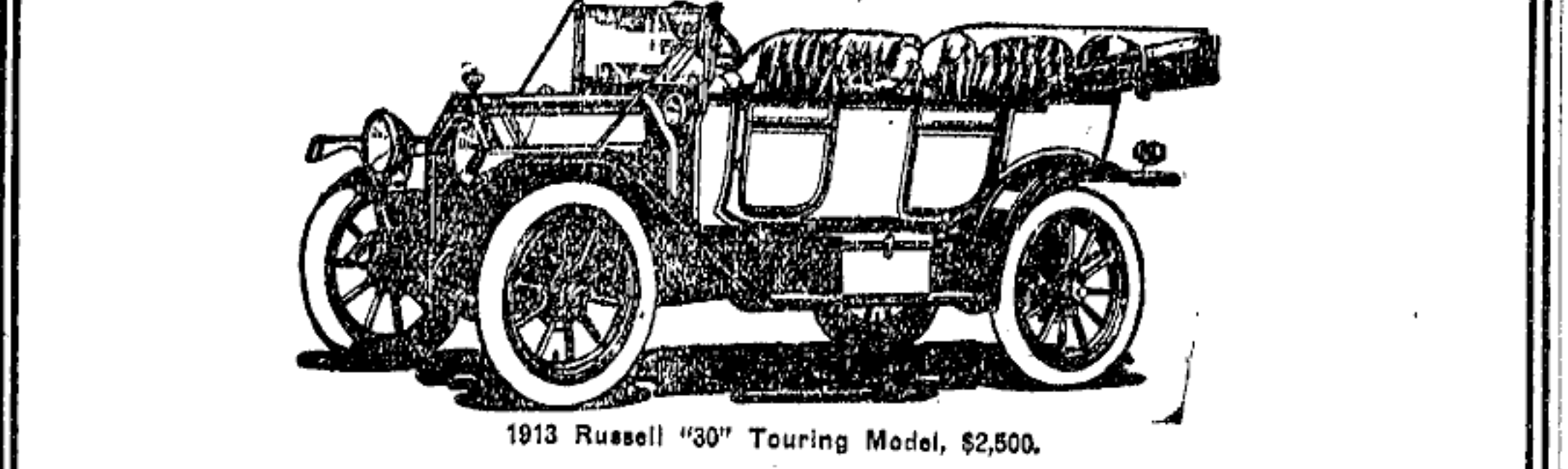
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
