THE AMENDMENTS

For T.A.B.A. Annual on Monday Night—Recommendations to O.A.A.U.

That the annual meeting of the Toronto Amateur Baseball Association, which will be held next Monday night at Moss Park Playgrounds, centre, Shuter street, is going to be a lively affair, is reflected in the number of notices of amendments to the constitution and by-law, and the aboul of nominations for a seat on the council.

The executive held a meeting last night, and following the closing of the nomination for office, Mr. E. G. Seyler, vice-president was elected president for the year 1917 by acclamation.

President Bert N. Brydon, after four years presiding officer, has retired, and as Mr. Seyler was the only man nominated, he steps into the presidency without opposition.

Mr. H. H. Roxborough, treasurer, was elected secretary, vice A. J. (Doc) Walsh, who has stepped out after four years of arduous work. Mr. Roxborough has been on the T.A.B.A. executive two years, and takes over his new job with the same vigor as the organization. He should make a capable successor to Mr. Walsh.

With the president, vice-president, and secretary elected, the interest in the elections for office is by no means eliminated. Ten men have been nominated for a seat on the council, which consists of four, and with ten seeking a place on a four-man council there is bound to be a red-hot battle.

Four amendments will come up for discussion. Three are amendments to the constitution, and the other an amendment to the by-laws. Here they are: Notice of motion from Toronto Senior League:—The annual meeting be held not later than two weeks following the closing of the championship season.

The Toronto Senior League are also asking that four cities, which prohibits teams leaving town in ball on Sunday. The motion is: That Sunday fall be permitted, and teams be allowed to play out-of-town on Sunday.

The Spalding league propose an amendment to the constitution whereby the immediate past president be given power to force in the executive. As it is now, past presidents sit on the executive but do not have a voice in the meetings. Mr. Brydon will be the first past president to have held the office of president four years.

The play grounds league will ask that the annual meeting for the election of officers and general business be held the third week in April and that a general meeting be held not later than the 1st of October, following the finish of the championships.

Motorcyclists Status. It was decided by the executive to ask the Ontario Amateur League for an interpretation of the status of a racing motorcycle rider in order to determine whether he is an amateur. It was also decided that all leagues must furnish a complete list of their officers on or before the annual meeting, power to force in the executive. As it is now, past presidents sit on the executive but do not have a voice in the meetings. Mr. Brydon will be the first past president to have held the office of president four years.

Ball players who are contemplating trying out with semi-pro or professional teams are warned that they automatically suspend themselves from amateur competition if they turn out practice with semi-pro teams or sign a certificate.
